



#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Originating in the 11th century, Carnevale lasts two to three weeks, having its final day on Tuesday, Martedì Grasso, just before Mercoledì delle Ceneri and la Quaresima (Lent), forty days prior to Easter.
- The wearing of the mask was a way for people to hide their social status and identity, and freely socialize with whomever they wanted. It allowed people to interact with other people from different social standings without being judged.
- Carnevale means "farewell to meat" which is in relation to Catholics eating all the meat they could before the start of Lent. Partaking in the last days of eating meat is part of the celebration of the Carnevale. A famous Carnevale food tradition is the frittole which are sweet fritters that can be stuffed with cream and have powdered sugar on top. Different parts of Italy make a variety of fritters called by different names.



**Lucrezia Marinella** (1571-1653) was the author of many works of fiction (both in prose and poetry) as well as of a polemical treatise concerning *The Nobility and Excellence of Women with the Defects* and *Vices of Men*. Her works were published in her lifetime under her name (not a pseudonym). In this respect, she was not unique within Italy—many other women wrote and published in the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. What makes her contributions notable are the breadth of her topics: *lives of saints* and *the conquest of Constantinople in the Fourth Crusade* to name but two and the pro-female stance that emerges from all but one of her works.



## Italian American Women Writers: Forging Identities Through a Shared Immigrant Heritage: Home




#### **Revisionary Identities** by Mary Ann Vigilante Mannino

Italian Americans, the fifth-largest ethnic group in the United States, make up a large segment of the population. It is only recently that the daughters and granddaughters of Italian immigrants have begun to write fiction and poetry about their experiences as Italian/American women. Revisionary Identities focuses on the writings of these women and argues that their works reveal a new identity that is composed of both Italian and American elements but which is neither completely Italian nor totally American. For these writers the categories of race, class, gender, and religion blur causing conflicts, which they try to resolve by imagining an allpowerful immigrant grandmother with whom they form a bond.




#### **The Voices We Carry** by Mary Jo Bona (Editor)

The collection voices the ongoing fascination with ethnicity in America. In this case, it is Italian-American ethnicity and its attendant themes - the ineluctable bonds between mothers and daughters, granddaughters and grandparents; the family rituals centered around but not limited to celebration and dining; and the desire to reinvent the meanings of ethnicity, especially for third-generation writers, in order to re-establish ties to the homeland country (Italy) and to renegotiate women's position within both American and Italian cultures. #### **Claiming a Tradition** by Mary J. Bona

Mary Jo Bona reconstructs the literary history and examines the narrative techniques of eight Italian American women's novels from 1940 to the present. Largely neglected until recently, these women's family narratives compel a reconsideration of what it means to be a woman and an ethnic in America. Bona discusses the novels in pairs according to their focus on Italian American life. She first examines the traditions of italianità (a flavor of things Italian) that inform and enhance works of fiction. The novelists in that tradition were Mari Tomasi (Like Lesser Gods, 1949) and Marion Benasutti (No Steady Job for Papa, 1966). Bona then turns to later novels that highlight the Italian American belief in the family's honor and reputation.



#### **Writing with an Accent** by Edvige Giunta

Mary Cappello, Louise DeSalvo, Sandra M. Gilbert, Maria Mazziotti Gillan, Carole Maso, Agnes Rossi. These are some of the best-known Italian American writers today. They are part of a literary tradition with mid-twentieth century roots that began to develop, in earnest, in the late 1970s and early 1980s. During those decades, a number of Italian American women, such as Helen Barolini, began to publish books that depicted their perspectives on life through the critical lenses of gender, class, and ethnicity. At the end of the twentieth century, this literature finally blossomed into a fully fledged cultural movement that also took into account issues of sexuality, age, illness, and familial and societal abuse. Writing with an Accent takes a look at this vibrant literary movement by discussing those first writers of the 1970s and 1980s as well as later authors.

# La Parola ai Nostri Membri

While growing up in a predominantly Italian neighborhood in the center of Lawrence, Massachusetts (The Immigrant City), in the fifties we boys would play handball in the park in front of our school. This handball was not like pickle ball or squash, but followed the rules of baseball with bases and a home plate. Twenty feet behind home plate was a granite monument which stands to this day. On that monument was a tribute to U.S. soldier Albert Campagnone who was killed in the European theater on December 5, 1944. On that same monument was also a tribute to his brother Carmen Campagnone who lost his life in Europe on March 8th, 1945. Next to Carmen was a tribute to brother Bernard Campagnone who also lost his life in Europe on April 14th, 1945. The U.S. Army thought that their parents Stephen and Maria Campagnone had sacrificed enough, so they arranged for their last son Anthony to be extracted from another danger zone in Europe. If you think this sounds like "Saving Private Ryan," you would be right. The Campagnones were the family the movie was based on. Anthony was able to make it back to Lawrence where he and his wife Anna Marie had a son Stephen who was born on March 8, 1946. We were schoolmates. The Italian -American community erected the monument in 1946, and the common was renamed the Campagnone Memorial Common. Stephen passed away on September 29th, 2021. He was a member of the Sons of Italy and the Knights of Columbus.



Detective Montalbano: The Shape of Water 2000 112 Minutes




#### Marriage Italian Style 1964 102 minutes


